POSTAMP PAGEANT OF SAN FRANCISCO - Illustrated Notes by FREDERICK J. BOWLEN - BOSTON

1. In November, 1542, Rodriguez Cabrillo, a Portuguese navigator, employed by Spain, first anchor in the Gulf of the Farallones, just outside of San Francisco Harbor, taking possession for the Spanish King. White and haze obscured the Golden Gate so that he passed by the Bay.

2. In 1595, Sebastian Rodriguez Cermeño, commanding the SAN AUGUSTINE, was wrecked in a small harbor north of the present Bay of San Francisco. This was the first visit in 1579 by Sir Francis Drake which was Spain's name.

3. On November 2, 1782, Sergeant Ortega, under Don Gaspar de Portola, with a company of men, in seeking a land route to the original Puerto de San Francisco, came upon a water barrier, later known as the Golden Gate, connecting a huge bay with the ocean in attempting to achieve his purpose.

4. On the night of August 9, 1775, the SAN CARLOS, under the command of Don Manuel de Ayala, entered the Golden Gate and anchored off what is now "Pier 45". This was the first vessel to enter the Bay of San Francisco. Ayala also made the first landing of the city.

5. On October 23, 1775, Don Juan Bautista de Anza left Tubac, Mexico, with a company of two hundred and forty men, under orders from the King of Spain, to found San Francisco. Father Pedro Font accompanied the expedition in the capacity of 1782-1872. Don Juan Bautista was the first to cross the strait.

6. De Anza, obliged by ill health to return to Mexico from Monterey, left Lieutenant Moraga the task of bringing the colonists to San Francisco. They arrived on the Laguna Dolores, named for Our Lady of Sorrows, on June 27, 1776, having achieved their pilgrimage from Mexico with only one death recorded.

7. The first white child was born in San Francisco on August 10, 1776, to the wife of an soldier named De Soto, who came with the de Anza expedition. In found San Francisco. The child was born in a temporary camp near what is now the Mission Dolores.

8. By September, 1776, a house for the Commander, a warehouse for supplies, a chapel for saying mass, and a group of houses for the soldiers had been built at the Presidio. The dedication took place on September 17, the feast of the Immaculate of the Stigmata of St. Francis.

9. The first mass in the original Mission Dolores was said by Father Palou on October 4, 1776, the day of Our Sorrowful Father San Francisco. But the real event celebrating its completion did not take place until four years later because of the absence of Commander Moraga from camp.

10. In 1792, the British explorer, James Cook, entered San Francisco Bay, anchoring in Sausalito. He was from the Presidio, called Yerba Buena, on Sand Island. By reason of ill health growing there, the Mission fathers presented him with an ox and sheep and a permit to erect a light.

11. In November, 1794, the Bay was crossed for the first time. Fathers from the Mission Dolores sailed across the Bay on rafts to convert the Indians of the east side. A fierce wind blew one of the rafts out the Golden Gate, but a second raft achieved its purpose. No Indians were observed.

12. On June 18, 1797, the Mission San Jose was established on the east side of the Bay on Contra Costa. A few days before Father Francisco Luason erected a rough wooden cross before a company of Indian and Spanish soldiers.
