Editorial:

We can count the number of authentic Poster Stamp scholars on the fingers of one hand. These are people who have a detailed knowledge of a wide variety of vignettes and have acquired a vast amount of information and background concerning them all. Subsequently some dramatic Poster Stamps were issued to help end the practice.



Crossing and playing in the street was often depicted as a hazardous undertaking. No doubt it was and still is. The following vignettes emphasize the point.









It wasn't until we came upon some German Poster Stamps that the hazards of living and working became graphically dramatic and very real indeed.

Not only are they designed well, but, we think you will agree, that they pack a powerful message into a very small space. Unfortunately we do not know what "IOGTN" and "JOGTN" mean, but we are sure to find out when this bulletin reaches our friends in Germany. We doubt that the "Hand that rocks the cradle" vignette could possibly be more dramatic. We are also impressed by the way the artist illustrates the man astride his white horse viewing a distorted world around him. Even the rays of the sun become disorganized as his perceptions of reality are compromised.



It is our hope that a Temperance specialist will tell us more about the great variety of "demon rum" issues. Temperance vignettes go way back and most are utterly fascinating.





A Visual Reply to the Question:


We hope that you will all decide to stay with us for another year. Please send in your membership dues by November 30th or sooner if you can and make your checks payable to:
