#### **Editorial:**

In the most recent <u>Cinderella Philatelist</u>, an article by John Denune appears that is entitled, <u>Cinderellas-Standard Terms of Reference</u>. Contained in this article is the following definition of a Poster Stamp. "A Poster Stamps is a paper adhesive of an educational nature, such as series issued by oil companies, or poster stamp societies: also National Park series, presidential seals, coats-of-arms seals, etc. Also under Poster Stamps I would include church stamps for rewarding attendance."

We find John's definition astonishing to say the least. Because we recognize that it is not easy to bring into clear focus exactly what a Poster Stamp is, we decline to find fault with John's attempt. We simply disagree with John's definition. Our definition, on the other hand, is not set in concrete. It can and probably will be modified at any time by anybody. Basically we think of a Poster Stamp as a miniature poster. To us it is a non-postal paper adhesive, usually perforated and generally the size and shape of a regular postage stamp. We disagree with John as to the purpose for which a Poster Stamp was created. We think a Poster Stamp is designed for the purpose of attracting, informing, or persuading the public in some way. Poster Stamps like their brothers and sisters—the larger posters—have informed the public of such coming events as carnivals, fairs, exhibitions, conventions etc. They have advertised products such as shoe polish, candy, automobiles, liquor, tobacco. They have promoted causes and ideas like, "Votes for women," or Peace in the world. Sometimes they celebrate a great victory, or an important anniversary. Often they have solicited funds for the Red Cross and other charities. In an artistic and dramatic way, they attempt to persuade the public to behave differently and to think differently. Thus, we find Poster Stamps telling people to drive safely, save the forest, pick up litter, etc. We find them urging people to support institutions such as schools, the military, unions. They are at their most persuasive in the political area disseminating propaganda. "Boycott Nazi Goods, God Strafe(punish) England, Remember Pearl Harbor are but a few of the slogans we find on Poster Stamps. They have encouraged travel by portraying scenes from Spain, France, Italy, England. And while our definition of a Poster Stamp does not deny its educational qualities, as John points out, it is just that if that was all there was to a Poster Stamp, we wonder who would give a damn about them?

Our friend, Jim S., wrote to us recently telling us why he liked Poster Stamps. These are some of his thoughts: "What interests me about Poster Stamps is that all of them seek to persuade the viewer of something: To continue attending Sunday school, to come to the Ausstellung (or to come to the next one if you missed the one displayed), to buy soap, to help the relief effort, to visit Hamburg, to keep your shoes shined, etc. So, in this perspective, they hold all the ingredients of advertisement, art, culture, self image, subliminal impact: even tragic vignettes of starving children or war wounded, were supposed to make the viewer feel good about something— about giving money to buy the stamp, or about the fact that someone else cared enough to give money to buy the stamp and stick it on something or other that came to the viewer's attention."

While we do not claim that Jim's enthusiasm or our tentative definition of a Poster Stamp is definitive, we do think that

it improves upon John's attempt to define a Poster Stamp.


### FOR CLARIFICATION;

A sticker is an adhesive paper, usually irregular in shape, that is used to decorate or bind the ends of the package together temporarily until it can be bound together more securely. In this sense, scotch tape is often used as a sticker.




