#### **Editorial:**

A response! May the Saints be praised! John Denune sent us the following article for which we are grateful indeed. He also sent us examples of what Poster Stamps should look like and we couldn't agree more. His illustrations delight the eye and warm the heart. John writes:

Several months ago I was pleased when Mr. L. N. Williams, of cinderella fame, wrote me to ask if it would be all right to reprint my article, "A Standard Outline For Cinderella Stamps", in The Cinderella Philatelist. This outline was 1st published July 1979 in The S. Allen Taylor Journal. I was glad that Walter Schmidt mentioned my article on his editorial page of the December 1995 Poster Stamp Bulletin. Walter critiqued my definition of a poster stamp, and without such input my plea for standardized terms in our hobby would go nowhere.

If we want to have standard terms for cinderella collecting, so that we can know exactly what another collector is talking about, we should have these terms explained. We must try to find agreement, as much as possible; rather than accentuating the negative. Also we should never put down the other fellows collecting interests; because all of us, as cinderella collectors, have felt discrimination by other philatelists. It is only in recent years, for example, that Christmas seals collections have been exhibited in competition at stamp shows. With positive input by knowledgeable collectors, such as Walter Schmidt, we may be able to better define our hobby.

Since Tom Steele's book, "Lick 'em Stick 'em" was published, the focus of poster stamp collecting has turned more toward seals with "strong graphic designs". My definition of a poster stamp is not incorrect, but it is too narrow, and does not go far enough. I would drop church stamps from my definition because I have found a better place for them. I would add to my definition, "Also including a host of labels with 'strong graphic designs' which may fall into a number of categories, such as events, funds, propaganda, etc."

If anyone would like a copy of my article, A Standard Outline For Cinderella Stamps, I would be glad to send it at no charge, for an SASE. My revised definition of a poster stamp now reads as follows: Poster Stamp- A paper adhesive, often of an educational nature, such as series issued by oil companies etc., and often approved by poster stamp societies of their day (1930's & 1940's). Poster stamps also include a host of labels with "strong graphic designs" which may fall into a number of categories, such as, events, funds, propaganda, etc. The following illustrations are a selection of typical poster stamps.












#### CHURCH OF SCOTLAND REWARD STAMPS.


Further to my article on these poster stamps, and in answer to the query by Jim S. in Bulletin Number 14, the answer is yes, collecting books do exist for these stamps. They are pretty hard to find, however, and I don't think many have survived. The illustration is of the Gilbert Oliver file copy for 1911-12 which now resides in my own collection. It contains a page for each month from December to November. In certain months, the fifth sunday attendance was rewarded with a stamp having a large "5" on it. It is a complicated subject. Generally about 60 reward stamps could be given in the year. As an example, in December there could be five sunday attendances plus an extra one on Christmas Day, for Christmas services. In January, there could be five other sundays, plus a special service at 3pm on the day following Christmas ---total twelve stamps for two months. In April, there would be a special service at 3pm on Easter day...hence an extra stamp for that month. There were special closing and opening services in June and October, hence additional rewards.

Although the years of production of these stamps were given in my article, they were used for some years afterwards and may be found in different year albums. Some of the stamps (extremely rare) exist in strips of five horizontally perforate but vertically imperforate.

# Red Meat and Red Faces

s if red-meat promoters didn't have enough problems: First Cybill Shepard, of the 'Real Food for Real People" ads, was quoted as saying she never ate the stuff. Spokesman James Garner checked into the hospital for heart surgery. Then Erik Pyontek, a college student from Trenton, N.J., went to a supermarket and saw a promotional poster put out by Fleming Companies, an Oklahoma City-based food wholesaler. The poster, showing a tall, blond cowboy holding the American flag, was meant to equate beef with patriotism. But Pyontek was reminded of a picture in a high-school history textbook. He confirmed his suspicion, then sent copies of the look-alike pictures to the press. Take away the cow-

boy hat and chaps, change the shirt color from white to brown, substitute a swastika for the longhorn tie, and what does the advertisement look like? A Hitler Youth poster

the country, says that the striking resemblance is only coincidence. "We're not trying to send out any subliminal Nazi messages," says spokesperson Cheryl Hudak. Jonathan Wood, vice president of Sully & Rozier, the ad agency that created the poster, says the artist was working from a photograph of a live model. (In fact, the model looks much less like the cowboy than the Hitler youth.) Until now, Pyontek and a shopper from Pennsylvania have been the only ones to notice the similarity. Still, Fleming officials recall what happened to Proct & Gamble when a run spread that the company's moon logo was a satanic symbol. Fleming is considering pulling the poster. And it has chosen a new image for its next promotional campaign:

Black Angus steer.
