

### American color proofs

Natacha Carlu, an artist prominent among modern French painters of the 1930s, was of Russian descent and married to Jacques Carlu who became professor of architecture at MIT. The two of them collaborated on a number of important Art Deco projects such as the second floor lounge of Boston's Ritz-Carlton and Eaton's Seventh Floor in Toronto, now restored and a venue for special events called "the Carlu."

She designed this poster stamp for the French Press and Information Service in New York in 1942. Below are progressive color proofs and a color trial wherein a brown color was applied to the Marianne that did not appear in the final stamp.

# A Word from Walter...Walter Schmidt

We have a vague feeling that we have told the story of Henny Porten before in some other publication. Oh well, what is one more time? She was a German actress, unknown in America, who made 170 films during her lifetime. Her first film was made in 1906 and her last in 1955. The first man she married was her director who was killed in the Great War in 1916. She later married William Von Kaufmann, who happened to be Jewish. This proved not to be such a good idea after the Nazis came to power. Because she refused to divorce her Jewish husband Joseph Goebbels personally saw to it that her film career ended in Germany. However, she did manage to make four films in Austria during WWII. Her home was bombed in 1943 and she and her husband were forced to live on the street for a time because it was illegal for any German to give shelter to a Jew. No doubt there is more of the Henny Porten story to be told. All we know is she did not have the happy Hollywood ending she deserved. She died, unknown, unloved, and in poverty after returning to Germany in 1960, five years after making her last film.

#### Poster Stamps as Address Labels...

The Port Huron, MI agent for the Phoenix Insurance Co. of Hartford, CT used cut-out labels to provide the address for a letter to the home office. No doubt, writing by hand would have been quicker!

# Early U.S. advertising stamps....

Benziger Brothers was a Roman Catholic publishing house founded in Switzerland in 1792. Its first offices in the U.S. opened in 1853 but publishing did not begin until 1860 at which time an office in Cincinnati was opened, followed by Chicago in 1887, thus dating this stamp to no earlier than 1887. Charles Kiddle sent this along.

Frank A. Gibbons was a well-known trapeze performer in the 1860's.

The cancellation on this stamp from the Mutual Life Insurance Co. of New York is dated May 28, 1901.

I can find no information about L.A.L. Smith & Co. of Palatine, IL.

For reasons best known to the manufacturers, stamps promoting tobacco and tobacco products are among the largest made during the 19th century.













# The New Haven Clock Company...

Founded in 1853 by Hiram Camp to supply movements to the Jerome Manufacturing Co., then the largest clockmaker in the world, it bought that company in 1856 and began making clocks themselves. The firm was reorganized in 1897 and finally closed in 1960.

A number of poster stamps were issued around 1898 to promote their new Tattoo intermittent alarm clock. The American Clock & Watch Museum dates the first appearance of the clock to a 1900 catalogue but the 1898 postal evidence suggests it appeared a bit earlier.

After 5 days, return to NEW HAVEN CLOCK CO., NEW HAVEN, CONN. & Minchester Baldwinville mass.

# The Golden Potlatch of Seattle...

Named for the gift-giving festival of the Pacific Northwest Coast tribes, the Seattle Potlatch events were held from 1911–1914 and 1934–1941. The "golden" reference celebrates the 1897 arrival in Seattle of the first gold-bearing ship, the *Portland*, from the Klondike River mines. The festival was an attempt to keep up the promotional momentum that followed the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition of 1909. The events included naval displays, aviation meets and auto races as well as parades, concerts and exhibits, all designed to show how forward-thinking Seattle was.

The following images show some of the poster stamps and ephemera related to these events.



Businesses had the Potlatch symbol imprinted on their stationery. 1912 was the first appearance of the Haida iconography. Of interest it the very early use of the 1915 P.P.I.E. machine cancel, first used on May 7, 1912.




To the right is a large gummed label. It also may be found as a window decal. The date is unclear but it is from the 1930s.

Below, the purple handstamp seems to be from 1911 although the dates don't match precisely. But the image only appeared in 1911.

At the bottom is the use of the 1934 poster stamp on a contemporary postcard.

# Golf on American Poster Stamps....Robert C. Bradbury

Golf was popular in the United States in the early 20th century and it was a theme in various advertising campaigns. Here we examine golf as portrayed on advertising poster stamps in 1914 and 1915. These stamps are attractive but there are relatively few varieties, many are difficult to find, and demand is high.

I have identified 23 golf poster stamps published during this period. Tourism is the most common advertising theme with nine stamps promoting golf in specific places. Clothing is next with six stamps. Other stamps advertise cars, banks, beer, lotion, magazines, newspapers and watches. The listing follows the images of 12 of the stamps.

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# **Plagiarisms IX...**

U.S. poster stamps are not immune from either being plagiarized or plagiarizing local or overseas designs. The Lindbergh stamp (Sc. C10) was clearly the source for the air mail label design. Some say it was made by A.C. Roessler but that has not been confirmed.

Rockwell Kent made this vignette for Modern School Magazine in the early 1930s. The Japanese copied it for their 1937-8 TB seal.

Of interest here is the use of the same design in two different cities. The wording on the package has been changed as well. This does not have the appearance of a stock design. The stamp on the left is green; on the right, blue.

On the other hand, the U.S. stamp is a stock design, the central vignette of which is virtually identical, less the shoulder strap, to the Dutch one which, I believe, is earlier.












# Civil War Era Promotional Labels....Art Groten


The 1856 John C. Fremont presidential campaign label is, according to Warda, the earliest U.S. political label. Below is a contemporary use pf the label on a telegraph envelope. In all probability, another Fremont label was present in the upper left corner.

Although the Johnson's Box labels are listed as locals in Springer, they are, in fact, advertising labels for a private delivery service as noted by Lyons. There are three typographical types, each known in orange and green. a fourth is shield-shaped. They are shown below. On the inside back cover is a correct usage of Type 2 on a Philadelphia drop letter c. 1865. Johnson's office was at 7 N. 10th St.; the addressee was at 1513 N. 7th St., several blocks away.







# DeWitt Clinton High School, Bronx, New York...

Opened in 1897 in Greenwich Village, DeWitt Clinton moved to the Bronx in 1929 where it became Haaren H.S. It is now Haaren Hall on the campus of the John Jay College of Criminal Justice.

The set of six stamps is an unusual production for a high school. They are black and white and appear to have been made around 1915.











# University of Minnesota...

Only slightly less unusual are stamps from a college or university. The Gopher, the mascot of U. of Minn., appeared on the 1917 pair while a post-WWI student appeared in 1919.


The upper left stamp has not been seen before.



### Original Painting for a Poster Stamp Robert C. Bradbury

Most U. S. advertising poster stamps in the 1912 – 1915 era start with a painting. This editor has only encountered one such original painting, the one shown here for Galvanotype Engraving Co., New York City, a company specializing in photo-engraving from 1891 to 1935.

This painting measures 72 mm. x 47 mm. The colors are yellow, green, blue, black and white. "Careful Work" appears to the right of the owl, although a faint penciled version is visible on the left. It is surprising that a painting for a poster stamp would be done in this small format. I would expect the artist to paint a larger picture and rely on photo-engraving to reduce the image. I have not seen a poster stamp based on this painting.



#### Poster Stamp Proofs Robert C. Bradbury

Shown below are four proofs of U. S. poster stamps, the only examples seen by this author. These were published by two Worcester, Massachusetts companies: Worcester Gas Company and Davis & Banister. (2 - 5) These proofs are 64 mm. x 56 mm. and printed on card stock. I have only seen no. 2 as a poster stamp but it is likely that all four were published. The printer is not identified but it is probably Davis Press of Worcester as the style resembles its poster stamps (see below).
