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## Barcelona Labor Stamps, 1914

In 1914, the printers of Barcelona were locked out of their jobs. A number of Catalan artists designed these stamps to help raise money to support them during their forced "vacation." They were printed by the Oliva Press which is still in existence today. The designs are quite remarkable and reflect the great breadth of Catalan artistic styles.

## A New Book: Old Home Week Seals

Member Terence Hines has printed his First Edition (2012) of the Old Home Week Seals, a particular niche of the poster stamp collecting field of the US and Canada. In a work of careful scholarship, Terry has defined his scope of work and has provided the historic and cultural significance of the effort, beginning in New Hampshire in 1899, to encourage local and regional pride as an antidote to declining populations and economic slowdown, especially in the Northeastern region.

Each listing is assigned a unique catalog number, alphabetically by state and locality within the state. Valuations are not provided "because there is just too little information to assign prices or scarcity ratings". The author appeals to readers to provide information, new discoveries or comments that could lead to a second edition, perhaps to enlarge the scope of the subject adding variations of the term 'Old Home Week'. By intent, this first effort is confined to the seals (labels or stamps) that follow the original promotional rastionale of the New Hampshire issues. Related ephemera is acknowledged and illustrated to provide further interest beyond the poster stamp collecting community.

## A Word from Walter...Walter Schmidt

Some years ago an auction was held in Bournemouth, England that offered a very large lot of unique Delandre material for sale. Nearly every lot contained a number of hand painted vignettes or previously unknown items. Everything was sold. Described in that auction was a separate lot containing some Australian vignettes. Alas, some unknown person bought this lot. It will ever be a source of persistent irritation for me to know that someone out in collector-land probably has unique Australian issues that I may never see. Can anyone help put me out of my misery?

## Len Deighton's "SS-GB"...

In 1978, Len Deighton, the well-known British novelist, wrote an alternative history story about the aftermath of a German occupation of Great Britain during WWII.

What is little known is that, as part of the promotion for the book, a booklet of "stamps" was released which included the usual blurb about the book on the covers and several booklet panes of stamps with Hitler's head replacing the King's. Has anyone ever seen one of these on cover?


## Theosophy...

From Wikipedia we learn that "Theosophy broadly explores questions of metaphysics, especially questions within the areas of epistemology, mind, religion and the sciences. The theosophist's premise is that knowledge must come from both external and internal sources, and requires both an existence and acknowledgement of internal and scientific truths. Both of these truths are given equal footing. Each individual theosophist's interests and questions are dynamic due to this dual focus on internalism and externalism. Another central interest is the application and use of knowledge for the betterment of both humanity and the individual."

The Theosophy Society was founded in 1908 and produced a monthly Journal. The design of both their cover and poster stamp is by Hugo Höppener.


## Now THIS is a poster stamp!

The cancellation informs us that this fabulous poster stamp was designed around 1925. It has classic French Art Deco styling and, while not signed, has similarity to other images by Rene Vincent.


## The Cinderellas of Ferdinand Schirnbock, Master Engraver...Art Groten

Almost everyone knows who Czeslaw Slania was: perhaps the finest engraver of stamps in the latter half of the 20th century. He produced glorious engravings for the stamps of Scandinavia, Monaco, Poland, the U.S. and other countries.

But who would hold that honor for the first half of the 20th century? My vote is for Ferdinand Schirnbock, master engraver for the Staatsdruckerei (State Printing Office) of Austria, who produced many of their finest stamps between 1906 and 1930, the year of his death. Below is a 1929 photo of he and his wife in the countryside near Vienna.

In addition to his work for Austria, he created the dies for stamps of Argentina, Bavaria, Bosnia \& Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Chile, Liechtenstein, Luxembourg, Montenegro, Norway, Russia, Siam, Sweden, Turkey and Vatican City. His work included bank notes, stock certificate vignettes and other similar engravings.

As near as I can tell, he has not received the same degree of coverage in the philatelic press as Slania and that seems odd. Two major articles appeared in the Essay-Proof Journal (whole numbers 75 and 131) outlining the known proofs of his work. He is casually mentioned as the engraver in listings of the various countries' stamps. But I can find little about the importance of his place in the
 design process.

Of particular interest to us is that, in addition to postage stamps, Schirnbock also engraved a number of Austrian Cinderellas, apparently all between c. 1908 and 1911. The earliest of the five known designs was issued in 1908 by the Society to Help Combat Tuberculosis in Childhood, Vienna. It depicts Princess Elizabeth. This label, as were the next three, were all designed by Joseph Urban, a prominent member of the Wiener Werkstatte. To the right is a color die proof from the Schirnbock Estate. 18 colors are known. A smaller version, without the lettering, appeared in 1911, in 4 colors. The earlier label was overprinted in Hungary in 1932. (below)



In 1909, Schirnbock and Urban produced an anti-TB charity label for the Alland Hospital, depicting Archduchess Maria Josepha. It is known in 10 colors with an imprint on the reverse (rarely found inverted). In 1914, it was reissued with a different imprint (in 5 colors) or without an imprint entirely (in 5 different colors). 8 imperforate color trials were made at the same time. It is a complex issue. A finished proof on card from the Schirnbock Estate is to the left. A 1911 cover to Canada with the label nicely tied appears below.


But his Cinderella masterpiece is the wonderful poster stamp he created working with one of the finest graphic designers of his time, Kolomon Moser, doyen of the Austrian Secessionists. It was for the 1911 International Stamp Exhibition in Vienna. He and Moser had worked together before to produce first the Bosnian set of 1906, then the Austrian Jubilee set of 1908 (and its many variants) and the similar Liechtenstein set in 1912.

The 1911 WIPA set is known in 11 colors. Eight of them have been applied to a postcard from the exhibition to Hungary to the right. The die proof on the front cover also comes from the Schirnbock Estate.

I hope this brief look at one of the great stamp engravers will prompt further study. I suspect there are other such Schirnbock labels. Does anyone know of any?


## Some Interesting Exhibition Poster Stamps...Art Groten

In addition to the poster stamps issued by the organizing committees, booth holders or others often had stamps made. There are many of them. Below are a few of the more interesting ones I have found over the years. They are self-explanatory. There are examples from Belgium 1930 Liege Exposition France 1931 Paris Colonial Exposition and 1937 Paris International; Germany 1911 Dresden Hygiene Fair, Great Britain 1911 Festival of Empire \& 1938 Empire Exhibition in Scotland; 1929 Barcelona International Exposition and 1904 St. Louis (U.S.) Exposition. The latter three, previously unknown, are by Adolph Selige, the same man who produced the set of 6 that includes the Mucha design.



## The Avenue Press, London, Makers of Poster Stamps

The Avenue Press in London was active at least as early as 1912 and is still in existence. It is probably best known for the WWI posters of Frank Brangwyn and the many London Transport and other British Rail posters of the 1930-40s. There were also publishers of magazines such as "The Boy's Own Annual"; books seem to be their predominant business today. I can find little detailed information about them. Perhaps one of our members can enlighten us. In addition to Brangwyn, they printed posters by Tom Purvis and Reginald G. Praill whose designs are quite distinctive.

There are two addresses on the stamps: Bouverie St., London and 55-56-57 Drury Lane, London. I believe they moved to Drury Lane from Bouverie St. but can't be certain as the stamps are not dated. I make the supposition based on style.

What follows is a compendium of the various poster stamps made by The Avenue Press. I start with Brangwyn's WWI issues which include two series of 6 stamps depicting images of war (the color of the lettering is difficult to reproduce) and a third for the Daily Mail and Evening News Funds. Next is a set by Edmund Dulac, also for the newspaper Funds. A long series of advertising stamps are then shown beginning with those by Praill which notes only London as the address; then a group with Bouverie St. in the imprint followed by the Tom Purvis design with the Drury Lane address. Note that two in the final row are slightly wider, a different format.

## Interesting U.S. Poster Stamps...Bob Bradbury

I see a lot of U.S. poster stamps and am always looking for the unusual. The first find is a group of three stamps for Kuner's Pickles. The one with the white background has, on the reverse, a promotional imprint for Smith-Broome Printers of Denver. The actual stamp itself has a design that has been modified in all its particulars. I think this would qualify as an essay until someone finds the first type without the imprint which would suggest that it was actually produced for use by the client.

One does not often find a postcard of the building in which poster stamps were produced. In the case of the United States Printing Co. of St. Louis we have not only a postcard but also an advertising cover with a seal made by the company on the reverse.


## Plagiarisms XI

Jaap Van Dijk and Peter Hannes Lehmann sent some interesting plagiarisms recently. The nice thing about them, like poster stamps in general, is that the images speak for themselves. We can see clearly where the inspiration to imitate comes from. Sometimes it is clear which came first but often it is not.

This first pair is somewhat unusual in that it is uncommon for plagiarisms cross national boundaries. We have seen some in this series of articles but not many. And, in this case, it is clear from the dates on the stamps that the Portuguese in 1923 copied the American design of 1915 . Such clear dating is not often seen.


Is it a plagiarism if the same company uses a similar design, altering many of the details?

Two purveyors of oriental carpets used the same design, changing some of the the wording and the image of the carpet.


## Before and After

In issue \#19, I showed some "Before and After" poster stamps. This was a frequently used promotional method to demonstrate the modernity of one's product or the beneficial results of using it. Sometimes the cause and effect are on one stamp, sometimes on two. One would think the appearance on a single stamp rather than two would be preferable; some of the power of the message is lost if one has to look at two, assuming they are both available for viewing at the same time. This fact must not have been lost of sales people as, to date, I have found only one pair, shown to the right. The message is that
 briquettes are cleaner than coal.

## Hans Christian Andersen
