## Replies to requests for Information

In reply to the query of what this is, Richard Grosse of L'Arc en Ciel answered that the stamp is Swiss, the city Biel, date probably February 2, 1916 and that part of the name is "Samaritains". The group is a curative society and a member of the Swiss Red Cross. The high 5 Fr. value suggests that it is an annual dues stamp rather than a contribution.
 That supposition is, at present, just that.

A while back I asked about this S.B. of A. stamp. I can't determine what the initials stand for but Paul Huber, expect of things maritime, notes that the submarine is of the type designed by John Holland in 1875 and finally, after considerable modification, was commissioned by the US Navy in 1900. It was the first to be able to travel submerged for any distance.

## "CHALO DELHI"

These labels depicts a corner of Red Fort in New Delhi \& inscription and were issued to members of the Indian National Army during its time in Burma in 1944. None have been recorded used.

The one pice label is found in violet and maroon both perforated at $111 / 2$ and imperforate. The one anna was only printed in green and, likewise it exists both perforated at $111 / 2$ and imperforate.

ANNIE BESANT

The label was most probably produced in 1917 when Annie Besant was elected President of The Indian National Congress. It was also the year when she was interned by the British for her views on Indian Nationalism.

The text reads " Home Rule / For God, Crown \& Country / Interned 16th June 1917 / India". Printed in pale mavue on thick ungummed paper, 20X23.5 mm, Perf 11

## AZAD HIND

The Azad Hind stamps were prepared for issue by Indian National Army during 1941-42 but never issued or used and now considered as cindrellas. Each label bears the legand "AXHEU" for Maria Axter-Heudtlass who designed these stamps.

Printed on both gummed and ungummed paper, the lower values are found perf or imperf, while the top value imperf only.

## The Stamp of Nostalgia: Posters on Stamps....Gary Loew

I recently found this article on the web at: www.9news.com.au Our poster stamps derive from such posters as these although l've not seen any of the ones below as poster stamps....yet!
"Five popular ad posters from a bygone era are making a comeback in the form of postage stamps.

Sonia Young from the Australia Post Design Studio headed the design of each standard issue 70c stamp based on artwork from the 1920s, 30s, 40s and 50s.

The 20th century advertisements in this stamp issue recall a bygone era of both poster design and Australian manufacturing. The engaging Little Penguin, promoting the attractions of Phillip Island in Victoria, was one of many commissioned by Victorian Railways in the 1930s. Harper's Empire flour, made by Robert Harper \& Co., was a popular household brand throughout the country in the 1920s and 1930s.

Perhaps the most famous of all Australian posters is the striking c. 1954 Trans-Australian Airways (TAA) advertisement. The kookaburra was the emblem of the Melbourne-based Jacko Polish Company, for which artist James Northfield designed this poster in the 1930s, and the label from Port Melbourne manufacturer Swallow \& Ariell was made in the 1940s for the front of a grocer's tin containing Teddy Bear biscuits.

Australia Post's manager of philately Michael Zsolt says the stamps reflect times when Australian industry, advertising and art were one.
"They not only recall a golden age of graphic design and visual advertising, but also a time when Australian-owned business and manufacturing thrived," he said."


I am certain there are others stamps from other countries that show posters. Certainly the recent U.S. issue of Circus posters does. Anyone know of others?

## The Rockwell Kent Greenland stamp....Art Groten

Rockwell Kent is arguably one of the most important and influential American artists of the 20th century just now coming to be recognized as such. He was prolific in all aspects of art. What is of interest here are the poster stamps and labels he designed. In this communication I will discuss only the famous Greenland airmail stamp he made in 1932, listed in Sanabria as a semi-official one.

Kent was living and working in Greenland at the time. Dr. Franck was leading an expedition to Greenland to make a film for Universal Pictures called "S.O.S. Iceberg". WWI German ace pilot, Ernst Udet, accompanied them and flew supplies in and out of their base camp. Kent and Udet met and, it is said, during an evening of drink, hit upon the idea of making a stamp to raise money for the local community center, charging 10 ore per stamp. Kent hand-cut the woodblock and made between 75 and 100 impressions, one at a time. Only 8 or so are known on cover. [I know of no singles.] On his return to New York, he made another, more refined, woodblock of the same design. 400 were printed by Pynson Press and perhaps 100 were signed.

Recently, several fakes have appeared on eBay and sold as such. The rarity of the original made such copies inevitable. Remember that the original was printed one-off. The fake has a wide left margin showing part of an adjacent stamp. And, of course, the cancels are totally bogus. It is a most interesting item. How many true poster stamps, i.e. those used only for promotion, have been faked? Comments?

Some might argue that this is not a true poster stamp but I would disagree. While it may be a charity label, its size and design integrity fit the criteria we have established. It is one of those pieces in the grey area: charity label, promotional label, poster stamp and semi-official airmail. Take your pick!
